Task 1

Read the text and answer questions 1 - 7.

Global Warming	
1.	Svante Arrhenius (1859 – 1927) was a Swedish scientist and he was the first to claim that using coal, oil and gas could result in global warming. He believed that there was a relation between the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere and average temperatures around the world. Arrhenius suggested that if the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere doubled, then there would be a temperature rise of 5 degrees. He calculated that human activities could lead to global warming.
2.	After his discoveries, his ideas were forgotten. At that time, people believed that human activities were insignificant compared to the activities of natural forces, such as the sun and the oceans.
3.	In 1955, a scientist called Gilbert Plass again began to argue that increased carbon dioxide in the atmosphere traps heat and leads to warmer temperatures. Then in the late 1950's and early 1960's, Charles Keeling used the most modern technologies to measure the increase of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. However, his findings were mostly ignored because global temperatures had decreased between the 1940's and the 1970's and the fear was of a new ice age, not global warming.
4.	It wasn't until the 1980's that average temperatures started to rise and scientists started to take the idea of global warming seriously. The media also became interested and pictures of melting icecaps and floods appeared in the news. In 1988, it was finally acknowledged that the climate was now warmer than any period since 1880. The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) was founded by the United Nations Environmental Programme and the World Meteorological Organisation. The panel consists of more than 2500 scientists and technical experts from over 60 countries around the world. The IPCC produced reports in 1992 and 1996 and a revised version in 2001.
5.	Some scientists questioned the findings of the IPCC, saying that they had overestimated the warming trend of the previous 100 years. The IPCC then reviewed their data but this did not make them change their minds. We now know that the 10 warmest years on record have all occurred since 1990.
6.	So far, not much has been done to deal with climate change. It is a global problem and cannot be solved by a single country working alone. Therefore, in 1998, the "Kyoto Protocol" was negotiated in Kyoto, Japan. It required countries to reduce their emissions of the gases causing global warming to fall by 5% below the levels in 1990. The agreement was signed by 186 countries. Since then, several countries, including the United States of America and Australia, have moved back from the agreement.

Task 3

Read these texts about the royal family and answer questions 14 - 21.

Text A

Last year the royal family cost the taxpayer £35.7 million, a rise of £1.9 million on the previous year. This rise is more than double the rate of the increase in prices of food, electricity etc. This big rise included a 45% increase in the amount spent on the royal palaces, including Buckingham Palace and the Kensington Palace apartments of the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge. Over the last two years, £4.5 million has been spent on the 20 room apartment where the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge live with Prince George.

This increase in spending came at a time when many ordinary people were struggling financially. Royal staff insisted that the almost £36 million was only equivalent to 56p per person and represented value for money.

Text B

The royal family is **essential** to our national identity, as is our national song or anthem (God Save the Queen). They do not, of course, have any real power but nevertheless they do a useful job, for example, raising funds for the poor and representing causes, such as "Save the Children". They represent the UK and work in a non-political way, whatever their own political views may be. They represent the nation's history and give us a sense of tradition.

The Royal Family is not perfect, but this makes them more lovable because we can see that they are just human beings like the rest of us. They bring a little bit of magic and excitement into our lives. The birth of Prince George a few years brought joy and pride to many in the nation.

Text C

Many tourists are attracted to the United Kingdom because of the historical traditions provided by the monarchy. People come from all over the world to visit Buckingham Palace and Windsor Castle. **They** aren't just royal residences; they are also great tourist attractions.

This brings a lot of money into the country. Would people travel from America or Japan, for example, to see a president? I don't think so! Even though the United Kingdom is a beautiful country and has some spectacular scenery, our climate is often wet and cold. We need the excitement and magic of the royal family to ensure that our tourist industry continues to do well. Many jobs depend on it.
