The Legend of Robin Hood

- 1. The story of Robin Hood is one of the most famous English legends. Many books, songs and poems have been written about him. There have also been many films made about Robin Hood, including one cartoon film. It is thought that he may have been a real person who lived in the 12th century, but no one can prove this, or who he actually was.
- 2. The story tells us that Robin Hood lived nea the city of Nottingham. In those days, the officer whose job it was to enforce the law was called the "Sheriff". It is said that Robin Hood had been a wealthy man whose land and castle had been stolen by the Sheriff of Nottingham. The Sheriff said that Robin was a criminal and wanted to imprison him. Robin Hood escaped to the forest, where he lived with a group of other men who had broken the law. These men wore green clothing to make them difficult to see in the forest. They became known as Robin's "Merry Men". The deer in the forest belonged to the king, but Robin and his men shot them with bows and arrows to feed themselves. According to the legend, they robbed rich people travelling through the forest and gave the money to the poor.
- 3. The rich people were frightened of going through the forest because of Robin and they begged the Sheriff to capture him. Finally, the Sheriff thought of a clever plan. He decided to hold a competition to see who was the most skilful with a bow and arrow in the whole county. He knew that Robin took pride in being the best and thought that Robin would not be able to resist entering the competition. Robin's men **urged** him to stay away. "This competition is being held because the sheriff knows you will want to enter. It would be foolish to walk into his trap," they said. But Robin was determined to go.
- 4. The day of the contest arrived. The Sheriff whispered to one of his guards "Has Robin Hood come?" The guard replied "No, Sir. Robin has red hair and none of these contestants have red hair. British people often think that they were the first to build a canal. However, the Chinese were really the first great builders of canals. The Grand Canal of China, which is nearly 1800 kilometres long, was built in the 6th century. The first canal on British soil was the "Fossdyke", which is only about 18 kilometres long! It was built by the Romans in the East Midlands during the 2nd century and was used for transport. The Exeter Canal, in the south-west of England, was built in 1566 and is a mere 6 kilometres in length.

In Britain, serious construction of canals only began in the second half of the 18th century. Manufacturing had begun to change from local men and women working in their cottages to people working in industrial mills and factories. A good transport system was needed to move the goods around the country and even abroad. Roads were being built and improved but they could not easily handle heavy and bulky materials like coal or steel or delicate goods like pottery. **At this time**, there were over 1600 kilometres of rivers which were deep and wide enough for boats. The problem was that they didn't go to the right places anymore. Transport was needed from the industrial north and centre of the country to the south and to the big ports so that the goods could be exported.

Around this time, the wealthy Duke of Bridgewater had been travelling across Europe and in the south of France he had seen the "Canal du Midi". This canal had been completed in 1681 and was about 250 kilometres long. The Duke returned to England full of enthusiasm for canals. In 1759, he decided to build a canal to take coal from his mines to the rapidly growing city of Manchester. Manchester needed a lot of coal for its industries and to keep its many workers warm in the winter. An engineer called Brindley was employed to manage the project. The canal was completed in 1776 and began half a century of canal building.

Brindley was now **in great demand** and went on to build even longer canals across the whole country. He was given the credit for the building of over 3000 kilometres of canals, linking the four great rivers of England: the Severn, the Mersey, the Humber and the Thames. By 1815, most of the British canals were completed.

However, with the coming of the railways, the use of the canals began to decline. The canals were neglected and by the middle of the 20th century, many were no longer working. Then in the 1950s and 1960s people began to see that the canals could be used for leisure and many were rescued. Nowadays, they are full of private pleasure boats, hired boats, hotel boats and day trip boats. It has been calculated that there are now more boats on the canals in Britain than there were during the height of the system's industrial use.
